Aims of the Workshop

The conference "Sick with fear -The culturally specific treatment of emotion and illness in the Ancient Near East" aims at connecting scholars of various subdisciplines in the research of the Ancient Near East to shed further light on the culturally specific aspects of the deeply human conceptualization of fear and illness, and how societies cope with their emergence and mutual influence. A particular attention will be paid to methodological aspects related to the study of ancient artefacts; we hope to open an interdisciplinary dialogue between philology, iconography and archaeology in the context emotions aroused by illness in ancient societies. The framework of the symposium remains deliberately broad for the moment, so that each participant is free to select the most relevant subject according to their disciplinary field. By joining various disciplines, e.g., Archaeology, Hittitology, Assyriology and so forth, we hope to gain deeper insights into the various dealings with diseases, relating those to specific explanatory patterns, also with regard to the sociocultural and religious backgrounds and to the affiliation of individual actors or groups to different emotional communities.
